GENERAL RULES AND REQUIREMENTS FOR YOUTH DIVISION

ENTRY

1. Eligibility - All Classes in this Division are open to youth in Huron County who adhere to the rules of the Huron Community Fair Board.
2. All youth exhibitors must be aged 5 to one year after High School Graduation by **December 31, 2026**, to exhibit at the Huron Community Fair, except for exhibitors in Division 094 - Special Education.

JLA youth exhibitors must be ages 8 to one year after High School Graduation by **December 31, 2026**, to exhibit, except Market Beef exhibitors must be age 9 to one year after High School Graduation.

SLA youth exhibitors must be ages 6 to one year after High School Graduation by **December 31, 2026**, to exhibit at the Huron Community Fair.

PLEASE NOTE: IN 2027, FAIR AGE WILL CHANGE TO MATCH 4-H AGE AS OF JANUARY 1, 2027.

3. Youth exhibitors in 4-H, FFA or SLA will pay an annual \$5 administrative fee to the “Huron Community Fair Youth Program” (HCFYP) at the Fair Office (fairgrounds) in Bad Axe.
4. JLA members must submit their JLA Registration Forms through FairEntry for Market Beef (Fats) by **Saturday, January 31, 2026**, Feeders by **Thursday, April 30, 2026**, Sheep by **Friday, May 15, 2026**, Swine by **Sunday, May 31, 2026**, and Dairy Cattle by **Sunday, May 31, 2026**. The \$5 annual administrative fee will be paid by the Junior Livestock Association to the Huron Community Fair Youth Program (HCFYP).
5. All other youth exhibitors (Independents) will pay an annual \$25 administration fee to the “Huron Community Fair Youth Program” (HCFYP) at the Fair Office (fairgrounds) in Bad Axe.
6. All youth exhibitors paying the annual administrative fee will receive a wristband for the week of the Fair.
7. All youth exhibitors must submit their entries through FairEntry for still projects and horses (open & youth) by **Tuesday, June 30, 2026**. A \$10 late fee will apply after the June 30th deadline.
8. **The exhibitor's age is as of December 31 of the current year to be used on entries.** Year in project, as listed on the green entry tag, is the number of years that a member has made the project NOT including Cloverbud years.

PLEASE NOTE: IN 2027, FAIR AGE WILL CHANGE TO MATCH 4-H AGE AS OF JANUARY 1, 2027.

9. All youth exhibits must include one attached green Huron County Youth Exhibitor Tag except large and small livestock, dairy, horse, and other animal project areas. Educational Exhibits must have a green youth exhibitor tag. This tag includes the exhibitor's name, age, exhibitor number, club or chapter name, class, and year in project. Additional items which are part of the exhibit must be

tagged with a yellow exhibit tag.

10. All entries, except those Divisions stated otherwise, must be owned/made by the exhibitor, and not shown at previous fairs or other county fairs.
11. An exhibit that was judged at another Fair cannot be entered and will be disqualified.
12. An animal or project can only be entered and shown in one market class.
13. The Danish system of judging is used where a member receives an A rating with a blue-ribbon, or a B rating with a red ribbon, or a C rating with a white ribbon for each project judged except for projects disqualified by the judge for not meeting the requirements. Upon the discretion of the judges, top blue-ribbon exhibits will receive honor roll ribbons. Premiums are paid by the Huron Community Fair and various sponsors. In the case of insufficient funds to pay premiums, premiums paid may be reduced or eliminated.
14. All non-perishable (still) exhibits must be in the 4-H and FFA Building, **Thursday, August 6, between 12 noon and 7 p.m.** These exhibits will be judged on Friday. Foods, house plants, indoor/outdoor plants, flowers, vegetables & crops must be brought in between **7 p.m. and 9 p.m. on Sunday, August 9, or between 8 a.m. and 9 a.m. on Monday, August 10.**
15. The 4-H and FFA Building will be open to the public from **11 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Monday through Friday, August 10 through 14;** and from **11 a.m. to 7:45 p.m. on Saturday, August 15.**
16. Exhibits in the 4-H and FFA Building will be released on **Saturday, August 15, between 8 P.M. AND 9 P.M.** After 9 p.m. on **Saturday, August 15,** the 4-H and FFA Building will be open under the supervision of fair management. **(If you cannot be there to pick up projects on Saturday evening, please plan for someone else to pick up projects for you.)**
17. Youth may show in Open Class following the guidelines in the Open Class Division.
18. **ALL ENTRIES ARE EXHIBITED AT THE EXHIBITOR'S OWN RISK.**
19. There will be a \$35 service fee for any reissued check for sale and fair premiums.

4-H CRAFT AUCTION RULES

Sale Order: Crafts, Poultry, Rabbits, Goats

The Huron County 4-H Leaders Association will be hosting their 22nd annual 4-H Craft Auction on **Saturday, August 15, 2026,** in conjunction with the Small Livestock Association (SLA) Sale beginning at 9:00 a.m. All members aged 8 or older by December 31, 2026, who would like to participate in the 4-H Craft Auction **MUST** adhere to the following rules:

1. Members **MUST be age 8 or older by December 31, 2026.** PLEASE NOTE: IN 2027, FAIR AGE WILL CHANGE TO MATCH 4-H AGE AS OF JANUARY 1, 2027.
2. A member can designate **one craft project** to sell upon entering the 4-H and FFA Building on **Thursday, August 6, 2026.** **ABSOLUTELY NO CHANGES OR ADDITIONS will be accepted after Thursday, August 6,** due to the printing of the SLA Sale Bill.

3. **Only one item** from specific project areas includes: House Plant, Terrarium, Outdoor Potted Plants; Knitting & Crocheting; Sewing-for-Fun; Miscellaneous Yarn and Thread; Creative Crafts; Original Crafts; Holiday Crafts; Fine Arts; Cultural Arts; Ceramics; Woodworking; Conservation; and Recycling.
4. If a member plans to sell two small livestock projects, they **CANNOT** sell a craft item.
5. A member can sell one animal project and one craft project; but cannot sell two craft projects.
6. All participating members **MUST BE PRESENT TO SELL** their item on **Saturday, August 15**. **If a member cannot be there, they cannot sell - NO EXCEPTIONS!!**
7. All members selling a craft item **MUST** pick up their auction item from the 4-H and FFA Building on **Saturday, August 15**, prior to the sale.
8. A 5% deduction will be made from each sale check for sellers participating in the Small Livestock Association Auction Sale. The money will be deposited in the SLA treasury to cover SLA expenses, such as sale expenses, buyer recognition, fair building and grounds improvements, and educational activities.
9. Sale checks will be issued and mailed out after the check has cleared from the buyer.
10. Sale checks must be cashed within 60 days after being issued.
11. There will be NO resale of craft items or livestock during the SLA Sale.
12. Adult exhibitors can sell a craft item provided the proceeds go to another organization (i.e. - 4-H, SLA, Fairground Improvements, etc.).

Once you win the Sweepstakes, you can no longer participate in the Sweepstakes Contest. Participants must except or decline participation in that year's sweepstakes for the 1st species that they qualify in. You must notify your superintendent one hour after the completion of that show. If they decline, they will not be allowed to participate in that year's sweepstakes. Each specie superintendent is responsible for securing a participant and animals for the contest.

WHO: The top eligible showperson from the following projects: Horse, Market Beef, Prospect Feeder, Sheep, Swine, and Dairy

WHAT: To select the best youth showperson from the above-listed project areas.

WHEN: Friday, August 14, beginning at 12 noon

WHERE: Show Arenas.

AWARD: Individual awards. The winner will have their name engraved on a traveling trophy.

TIM FRITZ FARM BUREAU

Tim Fritz Farm Bureau will award a trophy to the **Top Showperson in the JLA Sweepstakes Contest** at the Huron Community Fair.

BECK STREET WOODWORKING

Beck Street Woodworking will present individual awards to the **Top Showperson in the JLA Sweepstakes Contest** of each specie project area at the Huron Community Fair.

Tim Fritz Farm Bureau will award a monogrammed jacket to the **Top Showperson in the JLA Sweepstakes Contest** at the Huron Community Fair.



JUNIOR LIVESTOCK ASSOCIATION GENERAL RULES

1. JLA exhibitors must be ages 8 to one year after High School Graduation by **December 31st** except for Market Beef exhibitors must be ages 9 to one year after High School Graduation. The exhibitor's age is as of December 31 of the show year.

PLEASE NOTE: IN 2027, FAIR AGE WILL CHANGE TO MATCH 4-H AGE AS OF JANUARY 1, 2027.

2. JLA and 4-H members must submit in their JLA Registration Forms through FairEntry for Market Beef (Fats) by **Friday, January 31, 2026**, Feeders by **Thursday, April 30, 2026**, Sheep by **Friday, May 15, 2026**, and Swine by **Sunday, May 31, 2026**.
3. Non-4-H or non-FFA members must pay a \$25 administration fee to the Huron Community Fair Youth Program (HCFYP) at the Fair Office (fairgrounds) in Bad Axe to be eligible to show.
4. All JLA exhibitors will receive a wristband for gate entry the week of the fair. Wristbands will be distributed at the mandatory JLA meeting held in the Hagen Show/Sale Barn Sunday afternoon.
5. All JLA entries must be owned by the exhibitor and may not be shown at other fairs.
6. All JLA animals entered in the fair must have an official RFID, Scrapie, or equivalent ear tag. All livestock must also be identified by approved RFID/Scrapie tags. If an ear tag falls out at any time, contact your Specie Superintendent immediately. **NO ANIMALS WILL BE ALLOWED ENTRY WITHOUT JLA APPROVED TAGS!**
7. Exhibitors are responsible for keeping their stall/pens clean. The chore times are from 7-9 a.m. and 5-7 p.m. only. Manure is to be placed in designated areas. This area needs to be kept clear of garbage. **MANURE ONLY**. Feeding, watering, and overall care of their animal(s) is required at all times. If negligent care of the animal is determined by the Specie Superintendent, a red tag will be issued to the exhibitor. A red tag will result in a \$100 deduction from your fair check. A second red tag will result in the removal of the animal from the grounds. Fines occurring before Thursday will be deducted from the exhibitor's check. Fines occurring after Thursday morning will be assessed through a billing to the exhibitor. Fines must be paid before their check can be released from UPI.
8. Final cleaning of stalls/pens must be done by 12 NOON Sunday at the end of fair week. The hog barn cleanup is at 7:00 a.m. Sunday morning for all exhibitors. There is absolutely **NO STALL CLEANING SATURDAY NIGHT! NO EXCEPTIONS!** This is load out time. We have way too many people in the way when we are trying to sort animals. Stalls/pens must be cleaned to the satisfaction of Specie Superintendent, or a \$100 fine will be issued. Communicate with your Specie Superintendent to be sure stalls/pens are cleaned properly.
9. To be eligible to assist in helping an exhibitor fit or care for their animal, you must be a Huron County 4-H leader, FFA advisor, immediate family, or otherwise a Huron County JLA Superintendent. Any violation or infraction will result in disqualification of the exhibit. JLA members must fit, show, and care for their exhibits. Senior Showman of all species is required to do all fittings of their animals the week of fair. The only individual allowed to help a Senior Showman is another Senior Showman, sibling, or parents. Failure to comply with this rule will be cause for removal from the fair.
10. Rules pertaining to exhibition of livestock at fairs and shows as stated by the Michigan Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Animal Industry shall apply to all classes.

11. Any exhibit found to have a communicable disease such as, but not limited to, warts, ringworm, foot rot, fungus, will result in removal from the grounds. NO EXCEPTIONS. If any of these diseases are noticed before your species show day, you will be asked to take your animal home. Please, if you think you may have a problem before weigh-in day, contact your Specie Superintendent. We are more than happy to assess prior to weigh-in.
12. All JLA livestock must be housed in the area assigned to that species. Animals are expected to remain in the barns unless being washed/fitted or shown.
13. All disagreements are to be referred to the Junior Livestock Association Board of Directors.
14. To keep walkways completely clear when animals are brought in, show boxes are allowed to be brought inside the barn after 1 P.M. on weigh-in day. Show boxes MUST be removed by 6 P.M. on the Saturday of the fair.
15. No exhibitors are allowed to have cell phones or hats in the show/sale arena while exhibiting or selling.
16. No additional fans are allowed to be used in any of the barns.
17. Weigh-in weight will be the sale weight for every JLA species.
18. Market non-sale livestock will be released on the Saturday of fair week after 10:00 P.M. All other livestock will be released on Sunday morning at the end of the fair.
19. Multi specie exhibitors **MUST** determine their sale animal by weigh-in of the fair year. This determination needs to be reported to the JLA Superintendents when you weigh in.
20. Any questions regarding a JLA species should be directed toward a JLA Superintendent. This is to be sure the answers you are receiving are accurate and follow the guidelines of our rules. Our contact numbers are published for a reason. Your Superintendents are here to help!
21. Unethical, inappropriate, and otherwise, inhumane treatment of animals for show preparation is not acceptable. The exhibitor will be disqualified if a violation is determined. At this point, the Fair Board will determine the consequences.
23. Sale order is determined by placings during the show. It is the discretion of the Superintendent to determine the sale order.

2. All Market Beef are to be brought in and weighed in on Saturday, August 8, 2026. Weigh-in time is between 9 a.m. to 12 noon. Market Beef (Fats) are required to weigh a minimum of 1,100 lbs. to be eligible to show and sell.
3. The Market Beef Show will be held on **Wednesday** of fair week, **beginning at 8 a.m.**
4. Market Beef Heifers, tagged as a Market Beef project, can also be shown in the Beef Breeding Class.
5. All male cattle must be castrated before the fair with no evidence of swelling. The castration process and testicles must be completely gone upon the weigh-in date of the fair. All animals not fitting these criteria will be immediately turned away. No horns or signs of scarring will be allowed. All evidence of dehorning must be completely healed at the time of fair weigh-in. (Dehorning should be done no later than June so there is time for proper healing.) Please contact a Specie Superintendent well in advance of weigh-in if you suspect a problem. **NO VET SLIPS, NO EXCUSES!**
6. Sale order for Market Beef will be determined by judging placement and superintendent discretion. Market Beef will be provided with a JLA tag during registration. That will be the number assigned to the animal. If the tag is lost, please contact the superintendent immediately.

1. All prospect feeders are to be brought in and weighed in on Saturday, August 8, 2026. Weigh-in time is between 9 a.m. to 12 noon.
2. Prospect Feeder weight range is from 375 to 700 lbs. Animals outside of this range will not be permitted to show. All animals will compete for Champion.
3. The Prospect Feeder Show will begin at 8 a.m. on Monday morning of fair week.
4. All male cattle must be castrated before the fair with no evidence of swelling. The castration process and testicles must be completely gone upon weigh-in date of the fair. All animals not fitting this criterion will be immediately turned away. No horns or scars from dehorning will be allowed. All evidence of dehorning must be completely healed at the time of fair weigh-in. (Dehorning should be done no later than June to ensure proper healing.) Please contact a Superintendent well in advance of fair weigh-in if you suspect a problem. NO VET SLIPS. NO EXCUSES.
5. Cloverbuds (ages 5-7) can show in Class 26 with the assistance of an adult or teen. Participants will be awarded a special Ribbon. See Division 095 for more information.
6. All Prospect Beef Heifers tagged as Prospect Feeders can also be shown in the Beef Breeding Class.
7. Sale order for Prospect Feeder will be determined by judging placement and superintendent discretion. 2. All heifers and cows are to be brought in on Saturday, August 8, 2026, and checked in with the Superintendents. Weigh-in time is between 9 a.m. and 12 noon.
3. All animals will be released on Saturday at the fair at 10 p.m.

SALE PROCEDURE: To be eligible to sell at the SLA sale on Saturday an EXHIBITOR MUST:

1. Register exhibit(s) online prior to the animal registration deadline.
2. Have animals weighed in/checked in at the appropriate time on Saturday.
3. Have photographs taken at designated time frame to be given to buyer.
4. Participate in showmanship (in respective class).
5. Participate in market class.

If one or more of these participation items are not completed, you will not sell on Saturday. NO EXCEPTIONS!!

EXHIBITORS RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. A MANDATORY EXHIBITORS MEETING will be in the Hagen Show/Sale Barn, **Saturday, August 8, 2026, at 2:00 p.m.** Fair Passes will be handed out at this time.
2. All poultry and rabbits will be delivered to the buyer processed, unless other arrangements have been made after the SLA Sale.
3. All exhibitors are required to participate in barn set-up, barn watch, or barn clean-up. A **\$25 penalty fee** will be charged to those who do not help with any of these events.

GENERAL SMALL LIVESTOCK RULES & GUIDELINES:

1. All market exhibits for the Huron County Small Livestock Association (SLA) Show & Sale must have completed the Fair Entry ONLINE SLA Registration between **Monday, June 1 - 15, 2026.**
2. All exhibitors must be Small Livestock Association members to sell at the Huron Community Fair and **must be 6 years of age to one year after High School Graduation by December 31, 2026.** Beginner Cloverbuds (ages 6-8) are eligible to sell market goats, poultry, and rabbits.

PLEASE NOTE: IN 2027, FAIR AGE WILL CHANGE TO MATCH 4-H AGE AS OF JANUARY 1, 2027.

3. If the online registration is not completed by the deadline, you will not be allowed to bring your animal to the Huron Community Fair. The Huron Community FairEntry ONLINE Registration is your responsibility, not the responsibility of your 4-H leader or FFA Advisor.
4. **Animal Weigh-In:** All animal exhibits will be weighed in by the exhibitor at check-in. Weights and classes will be posted in the barn for goats.
 - a. **Goats - Saturday, August 8, 2026, 8 a.m. to 12 noon**
 - b. **Poultry - Saturday, August 8, 2026, 8 a.m. to 11 a.m.**

- c. **Rabbits - Saturday, August 8, 2026, 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.**
5. **Pictures** for all SLA sale projects will be **Saturday, August 8, 2026, 3 to 6 p.m.** and **Sunday, August 9, 2026, 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.** All exhibitors **MUST** be available for pictures during this time frame! No picture, no sale! Lab coats will be available on the day of pictures.
6. If registering in a Market Class, selling your market animal is optional, unless the exhibitor is awarded the honor of Grand or Reserve for their Class.
7. A member is allowed to exhibit TWO sellable SLA exhibits at the Huron Community Fair; this also includes your crafts exhibits. This means a member will only be allowed to sell two items in the SLA auction. All champion market exhibits must be sold in the SLA auction.
8. The exhibitor must be the owner of the animal in all Market Classes.
9. If a member has sold any livestock at any county fair in the current year, that member is not eligible to compete in the Market Class, which would result in the selling of that project at the Huron Community Fair.
10. Members are responsible for keeping their exhibit clean, feeding, and watering and caring for their animal until the exhibit is removed from the fairgrounds. Daily morning chores are to be done by 10 am. Daily evening chores are to be done from 5-7pm. If chores are not done appropriately (fed, watered, and cleaned) by 12 noon, Superintendent may red tag the pen. If your pen is red tagged, your pen must be brought up to code by 5 p.m. that same day. If on any other day during the week of the fair your chores are not done properly, the Superintendent will issue another red tag. If chores are not done properly by 3 p.m. your pen will be black tagged. If a black tag is issued your pen/or animals will be asked to be removed from the fairgrounds. If you receive any awards, they will be forfeited.
11. Rules pertaining to exhibition of livestock at Fairs and Shows are stated by the State Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Animal Industry, found in this Premium book, shall apply to all Youth Classes.
12. A 5% deduction will be made from each sale check for sellers participating in the Small Livestock Association Auction Sale. The money will be deposited in the SLA treasury to cover SLA expenses, such as sale expenses, buyer recognition, fair building and grounds improvements, and educational activities. **A \$5 Fair Administration fee is to be paid by all exhibitors, if selling at the sale it will be deducted from each sale check.**
13. Small Livestock Association Checks will be made available after buyers have paid for their purchase. Please allow at least four weeks after the SLA auction to receive your check. Checks will be handed out at the meeting immediately following the fair.
14. Auctioneers shall be furnished by the committee in charge.
15. Sale checks must be cashed within 60 days after being issued.
16. All disagreements are to be referred to the SLA Board of Directors.

17. There will be no resale of livestock during the SLA sale. All exhibits will be sold once with the buyer determining at the time of check out where their sale purchase will return to (i.e., slaughter, take home live, donation of market pens of rabbits or fryers to the Sanilac County Fair Miracle of Life Barn).
18. The SLA barn will close at **9 P.M. on Saturday at the end of the fair to prepare the barn for animal release.**
19. All animals will be released on Saturday at the end of the fair at 10 p.m. **All animals must stay until this time, or the exhibitor will forfeit the right to exhibit at next year's fair.** No animals may leave the barn prior to 10 p.m.! All animals must be checked out upon leaving and cannot be removed when barn is closed.

1. All goats must be brought in on **Saturday, August 8, 2026, between 8 a.m. and 12 noon**. All market exhibits for the Huron County Small Livestock Association (SLA) Sale must have completed the FairEntry ONLINE **SLA Animal Registration Forms**. These forms must be submitted between **Monday, June 1-15, 2026**. All Market Goat exhibits for the SLA Sale must be ear tagged with an SLA tag.
2. All goats moved within Michigan shall be identified with an official USDA scrapie program identification tag. All goats entering the fairgrounds must have this tag. Do not remove tag prior to weigh-in or showing. It is illegal to remove official USDA individual animal identification tags.
3. Show day order: Showmanship, Lightweight Market Classes, Heavyweight Market Classes, Homegrown Classes, and Dairy Classes. It is the member's responsibility to have the animal in the show ring at the time of judging, not the superintendents or your leaders. Classes will go on without your animal. Please refer to the SLA General Rules section for more information.
4. All goats must be entered in all Classes, in which an animal will be shown. These entries are necessary for housing arrangements and program schedule.
5. Goat's weight at weigh-in is weight animal will be sold at.
6. Selling your market animal at the SLA Sale is optional unless the exhibitor is awarded the honor of Grand or Reserve for their Class.
7. Goats entered in Section A (Dairy Goats – All Breeds) cannot have horns.
8. No animal is permitted to be shown by more than one exhibitor, except for the Peewees.
9. Grand Champion and Reserve Champion awards will be presented to animals of high quality and deserve added recognition.

10. All SLA exhibits will be released on **Saturday, August 15, 2026, at 10 p.m.** Release of Small Market Livestock by **9 a.m. on Sunday, August 16, 2026.** Barn clean-up from 8 a.m. - 12 noon on **Sunday, August 16, 2026.** All pens are required to be cleaned and sanitized. All exhibitors on the list are required to be present or will be penalized.
11. Pet goats must show in showmanship.
12. All market and pet goats are to be born after **August 1, 2025, and before April 1, 2026.**
13. All male goats must be castrated before the fair with no evidence of swelling; the castration process and testicles must be completely gone upon weigh-in date of the fair. All animals not fitting this criterion will be immediately turned away. All evidence of dehorning must be completely healed at the time of fair weigh-in. (Dehorning should be done no later than June so they will heal in time). Any questions call the superintendent at least 4 weeks prior to weigh-in date of the fair. No vet slips. No excuses.
14. **New Rule from 2025, Exhibitors 11 years old and older (by December 31 of the current year) must have a market goat (50 lbs. or heavier) if they wish to sell at the sale. Exhibitors ages 10 and younger will still be allowed to sell pet goats at the sale.**

It is the member's responsibility to have the animal on the table at the time of judging, not the superintendents or your leaders. Classes will go on without your animal. **If**

3. If you are exhibiting any rabbits, the rabbits must be tattooed. Tattoo kits can be purchased at farm stores and online. 5. Rabbits will be judged by American Rabbit Breeders Association standards. Showperson will be judged by Michigan Rabbit Fitting & Showing Members Guide. A bulletin is available at the MSU Extension Office (Bulletin #1268) which provides showmanship rules and how-to's. Exhibitors are expected to wear black slacks, black shoes, white shirts, or white lab coats.
6. The Peewee (ages 5 & under) class will be held in the morning along with the Showmanship Classes. All Peeweesees will be showing rabbits at this time.
7. Rabbits' entry cards will be filled out with breed, variety, sex, ad class at time of check-in. Any rabbit being shown at the show, including those that do not stay at fair but come just for show day MUST be registered online by the fair registration date AND have an entry card completed during check-in.
8. All entry changes must be made before 8 p.m. the day prior to the show by contacting a rabbit superintendent.
9. Rabbits must be watered a minimum of TWO times per day, or the cage is eligible to be red-tagged.

2. A Senior (ages 15-19) may exhibit either a maximum of three crops and one educational exhibit or four crops from this Division.
3. Crop exhibitors must have complete up-to-date records to exhibit at the fair.
4. A card giving crop project information will be required on all sample exhibits. This will include

variety, planting date, plant population, fertilizer analysis, amount per acre and yield. (Any exhibit improperly tagged will be disqualified.) Crop cards are available at the MSU Extension Office, Bad Axe.

5. The beet exhibit consists of three sugar beets of uniform size and length. The tap root and the crown should be intact, but the root hairs and green petioles should be removed flush to the crown and no visible hollow crowns. The beets should have no sprangles and dirt should be lightly brushed off so that the outer skin is not scuffed or damaged. (Beets may be washed if dirt cannot be removed otherwise.) Beets should be attached through the middle with a single, thick wire (preferably a straightened coat hanger with ends crimped).
6. A peck sample may be from the previous year's crop or current year, except for members in their 1st year who must exhibit a project from the current year.
7. Sheaves, corn stalks, bean vines and sugar beets must be from the present year's crop.
8. All grain samples can be exhibited in a wooden peck box, a one-gallon wide-mouth glass/clear plastic jar or a two-quart wide-mouth glass/clear plastic jar.
9. All grain samples must be new and not previously exhibited. Grain samples will be checked to see if they were exhibited before, and if so, all the member's exhibits will be disqualified.
10. Corn exhibits may be either three stalks tied together (top, middle, and bottom) and roots removed or one peck sample.
11. Beans may be three stalks tied together at bottom or one peck sample.
12. Grain may be exhibited either as sheaves or in peck sample boxes. Sheaves for all grain must not exceed 30" in total length or be less than 24" in total length. They must have a 2" diameter (the distance across) or 6.28" in circumference (the distance around) at base of heads and LEAVES STRIPPED. Exhibits will be disqualified if they do not meet requirements.
13. Cured hay can be exhibited in either a 4" bale slice that is put in a box 16" x 18" x 6" with a clear plastic cover or in a clear plastic bag or it can be exhibited as one quart of hay seed. All other types of bags or containers will be disqualified.
